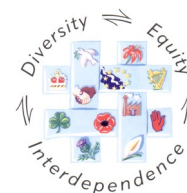

2016/17 District Council Good Relations Programme Workshop

The 2016/17 District Council Good Relations Programme Workshop took place on 16th May at Oxford Island Discovery Centre. The Workshop is held every year to evaluate the Programme and use the analysis to improve good relations delivery in the future.



The key aim of the District Council Good Relations Programme is to promote good relations and support local solutions to local issues. The Executive Office has introduced a number of initiatives to the Programme in recent years, including the implementation of an outcome focus and better communication, with a newsletter and a video showcasing the difference the Programme is making. The workshop included presentations from Intercomm, Co-operation Ireland and Mid and East Antrim Borough Council. The groups discussed their experiences with introducing an outcome focus, and shared best practice with attendees on how to maximise the benefits of its implementation into programme planning and delivery. TEO officials also discussed how the new District Council Action Plan allowed the analysis of programmes by unit cost; outcome achieved, and links to wider strategic aims, with a view to improving Programme efficiency and effectiveness.

The workshop also provided an opportunity for colleagues from other business areas including Urban Villages, Statisticians, T:BUC Camps, Central Good Relations and Governance to improve connectivity between different TEO interventions and maximise delivery.

93% found the event "useful" or "very useful" and the individual feedback will be used to inform the planning and design of future events.

The North Belfast Strategic Good Relations Programme (NBSGRP)

The NBSGRP is delivered as part of the Executive's wider Together: Building a United Community (T:BUC) strategy. The Programme is jointly managed by The Executive Office in partnership with the Community Relations Council (CRC). The Executive Office oversees the strategic direction and evaluation of the fund, with CRC taking responsibility for the financial and administrative aspects of the Programme.

The NBSGRP consists of 12 contract holders, delivering a wide range of Good Relations provision in north Belfast through a large number of partner organisations and providers.

An event was held on the 2nd May to celebrate the work of the partner groups, to share good practice and to evaluate the 2016/17 programme.

As part of recording the learning coming from the work during the year a [video](#) has been produced outlining the programmes the groups have been running and the difference they have been making in the local community. Also a newsletter detailing the work of the Programme has been distributed to households in North Belfast and an electronic copy will be placed on the website shortly.

North Belfast Women's Voices; Exploring Identity, Culture & The Future

On Friday 28th April WRDA launched their research 'North Belfast Women's Voices; Exploring Identity, Culture & The Future' in the Houben Centre Crumlin Road.

The research funded through the Community Relations Council focused on 5 groups of women in the district. At the launch Good Relations Worker Kellie O'Dowd who carried out the research said,

"These women have battled through many of the worst things that our conflict has had to throw at them. They have faced personal tragedy both political and 'ordinary'. They have faced intimidation, they have faced poverty, mental and other health issues, social disruption, housing problems, the loss of employment, being put out of some areas and choosing to leave others. They have worked in and across communities with piece meal funding that means when real work gets underway it can be over because resources simply 'run out'. They do what women have always done, what they can with what little there is. What they have never lost is their dignity, their humanity

and their motivation to make things better for their communities and their families.

*I personally feel we owe these women their place in history, and a seat at the decision making tables when it comes to decisions that affect their lives, the lives of their communities and future generations and that is essentially what this piece of research is about. It is about the women speaking for themselves about the issues that they feel are important. **I hope this is one way of helping realise that the future is women.** Our collective way of working together within and across communities gives us the unique ability to see the humanity in each other while understanding that people have different allegiances, different affiliations and different ways of doing things, but what we want is a better life for all with no-one left behind, and for that we are willing to negotiate, compromise and do things for the greater good. So much of this work goes on below the radar for various reasons that we will touch on in the report, but it's time some light is shone on these powerful peace-makers, peace-builders and peace keepers."*

The issues that were documented included dealing effectively with Paramilitary influence and control in communities, flags emblems and marking space, political leadership, the impact of funding on groups, community development, community relations, housing and moving forward.

Director Anne Mc Vicker said,

"Women in North Belfast having seen so much, endured so much and have been part of so much of the out workings of a political conflict. They have yet to reap the benefits of relative peace. They are entitled to their rightful place at the political and decision-making tables, to have a voice on issues that impact their communities and not just be called on the clean up the political and community messes once the television cameras, politicians and gatekeepers have all disappeared."

WRDA hope to build on this work with the women in the near future.

Refugee Week 2017 is a celebration of our shared future, focusing on how collaboration between people from different backgrounds strengthens communities.

This teaching resource is designed to help learners see refugees as “someone like me”, at the same time as recognising and accepting our differences. It enables young people to explore universal human values and mutual respect and understanding, building empathy towards refugees and asylum seekers. It also looks at how refugees have contributed to the communities they live in, encouraging young people to take positive action to create a shared future.

There are five activities in the resource, and each of the activities is designed to take approximately 30 minutes.

[Activity 1: “Someone like me”](#)

This activity uses aspects of identity to stimulate dialogue and provide an opportunity for young people to challenge their own thoughts about refugees and asylum seekers. The focus is less on the label of “refugee” or “asylum seeker” and more on the common humanity of refugees/asylum seekers as “someone like me” (someone that I can relate to).

[Activity 2: Mutual respect and understanding](#)

This activity explores the importance of mutual respect and understanding for creating communities. It introduces learners to universal human values and asks them to consider their own values, as well as the values needed to build mutual respect and understanding.

[Activity 3: Building empathy](#)

This activity introduces young people to a real-life story to help them build empathy for refugees and asylum seekers. It is based around a [short film](#) (3 min 26 sec) about Ali, who came to the UK from Afghanistan. Young people think about Ali's needs and values before considering the similarities and differences between Ali's values and their own.

[Activity 4: Community building](#)

This activity provides case studies of refugees and asylum seekers making a positive contribution as active citizens to the communities that they live in. It helps young people to consider refugees as fellow citizens and to think about their own role as active citizens.

[Activity 5: Taking positive action](#)

This final activity builds on the previous activities, focusing on the roles that young people can play in creating a positive shared future. It asks them to consider values, attitudes and actions in order to produce a positive action plan. The outputs from this activity could be used for wider sharing.

KABOSH

Kabosh Theatre Company is delighted to announce they are opening the **SCENE: Northern Ireland 2017** arts festival at the Societaets Theater, Dresden Germany, held from 9th – 18th June 2017.

Kabosh will open the festival on 9th June with their critically acclaimed production *Green & Blue* which has just been nominated for the 2017 Writers Guild of Ireland ZeBBie Award for Best Theatre Script.

Written by Laurence McKeown, and inspired by an oral archive of serving RUC and An Garda Síochána officers, the show explores the painful and humorous realities faced by individuals who patrolled the border during the height of the conflict in Ireland.

On June 11th Kabosh will present a second performance, *Those You Pass On The Street*, which examines the human legacy of conflict and how we as individuals, and as a society, deal with the past. This production toured to the National Arts Festival, South Africa, and the Ubumuntu Festival, Rwanda July 2016.

Alongside showcasing work Kabosh Artistic Director Paula McFetridge will also facilitate two post-show discussions, and masterclasses for local practitioners on 'peacebuilding through the arts', as well as staging an interview with Laurence McKeown, before a screening of his 2001 feature film, *H3* on 10th June.

Paula McFetridge, Artistic Director of Kabosh said, "It is fantastic to see the unique work created here being celebrated and showcased across Europe. It is so important that we continue to, not only create this work, but present it and understand it in an international context. Having recently toured work to South Africa and Rwanda, as a company we are acutely aware of the relevance and resonance of our work for international audiences and are very excited to bring several pieces of work, in the hands of great local practitioners, to the Societaets Theater, Dresden'

Since 2007 Societaets Theater, Dresden, has staged the **SCENE: EUROPA** festival. Each year the festival showcases outstanding, independent professional theatre from a chosen country within Europe. 2017 will celebrate the unique theatre being created in Northern Ireland.

Collecting the Troubles and Beyond

When it opened in 2009, the Troubles gallery at the Ulster Museum consisted entirely of black and white photographs and text, its impact was limited by the absence of original artefacts and alternative perspectives. Funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund, through the Collecting Cultures Programme, has enabled National Museums NI to address the limitations of the Troubles gallery.

Entitled 'Collecting the Troubles and Beyond,' the project aims to widen the scope of the museum's contemporary collection relating to this complex period of Northern Ireland's history. The next stage in the development of the Troubles gallery will take place later this year. It will provide a broader context to the Troubles period and will examine the wider social, economic, cultural, as well as political, influences which have shaped Northern Ireland, enabling more nuanced and inclusive engagement with this complex period of history. The inclusion of material relating to a 'post-conflict' Northern Ireland will also enable greater exploration of continuity and change within local society.

Our aim is to create a gallery that is dynamic and that offers opportunities for people to respond and contribute their own stories. The museum is engaging with communities to develop its contemporary collection through a series of community based events, collection workshops and outreach activities as well as open invitations to contribute. We are seeking to work with community groups and representatives to establish the significance of events and objects through these workshops and dialogue.

To date we have held a number of events that both inform our approach to interpretation and at the same time promote openness and discussion around our activities. These include seminar days on themes of diversity and ethics, as well as outreach events at local libraries and hosted talks. As well as working on the Troubles gallery at the Ulster Museum we have developed touring exhibitions based on contemporary photography. In March this year we launched a temporary exhibition in the Ulster Museum entitled 'Gay Life and Liberation: A Photographic Record from 1970s Belfast'. The exhibition was developed in partnership with Rachel Wallace, a Ph.D. candidate from Queen's University, and is based on the photographs of Douglas Sobey.

Deirdre MacBride, Programme Director at CRC, has described this initiative as "a unique opportunity to create a space in which dialogue and understanding about The Troubles can occur, which is situated in the context of Northern Ireland's continuing emergence from years of conflict and violence and in which we are building peace and democracy."

Softening images of Partition

Although John Irvine left Northern Ireland over 15 years ago, having grown up about East Antrim, he retains "strong links" and comes home frequently. Irvine explained how one morning drive accidentally led him to his book, [Partition](#).

Irvine picked up photography in his mid-20s, mainly as a means of unwinding. By now living in Scotland, he would venture out to photograph classic cars, his focal point. The wonderful natural surroundings of the cars caught his attention; he soon was photographing the landscape exclusively.

He studied the work of landscape photographers, [Joe Cornish](#) and [David Ward](#), and acquired a medium format camera. Irvine's choice is colour negative film, "because of its huge dynamic range and high margin of error". He likes the softness of tone for his low contrast scenes, too.

I asked if there was any significance in the use of mist in some images in *Partition*. Irvine described how it is such a good tool to naturally distil and calm images: "I didn't want to make the places look bleak. The objects are very stark and strong; I didn't want to enhance that." The mist softens the hardness.

Indeed, Irvine would have applied this approach more, but as he was only home certain days, he had to work with what the weather presented to him.

To put the images in context, Irvine said that he had to re-educate himself and re-engage his mind in regards to the past and the present. He stumbled across the name Jonny Byrne in his readings, and reached out to him. [Byrne](#) — a lecturer in the School of Criminology, Politics and Social Policy at Ulster University — very kindly wrote the foreword to *Partition*.

Irvine said that [Interface Architects](#) lent a "kind ear" and gave him encouragement. His ambition is for the work to go back into the community, to be used for structured conversations. He does not want the printed images to collect dust: "I would love them to be in the open outdoors in the centre of Belfast."

Softening images of Partition continued

The geo-political boundaries of Belfast weren't the only ones Irvine had to deal with; Brexit played a role in the publishing of the book. [Triplekite](#) — which published [The Last Stand](#) by Marc Wilson (displaying abandoned WWII sea defences) — expressed a sincere interest in Irvine's peacewalls work. However, last June's referendum result on EU membership caused Triplekite to pause (the fact their printing presses are in Malta may have influenced this). Keen to get the book published, Irvine pressed on himself, raising funds and having it published by [Kozu Books](#) (which previously published his work in [Landscape Editions, Volume 1: A Path not Far](#)).

Could he be tempted back for a follow-up project in Northern Ireland or elsewhere?

"I would love to," Irvine answered. "I like juxtapositions and contrasts, and stories within stories in a photograph; I look at things this way."

When Irvine was back in Northern Ireland last summer, he said that he was encouraged by the remarks he heard by ordinary people:

"There is a dynamic landscape politically in Northern Ireland. Mindsets are changing for the better, but whether people in charge are reflecting that (is another issue). My exposure to people there has been a breath of fresh air."

There is no doubt that Irvine cares about the place he grew up — its landscape and its people. He is true to the definition of social landscape photography, and we anticipate his next car journey inspiration.

Department of Communities World Refugee Day

On World Refugee Day (20 June) the Department of Communities (DfC) is holding a policy seminar for its staff on the important work being undertaken to resettle Syrian refugees into Northern Ireland. The event, held at Farset International, Springfield Road, will involve presentations from some of the consortium organisations involved in delivering the resettlement programme. Organisations such as Barnardos, Save the Children and British Red Cross have all brought a mix of expertise, additional resources and contacts in the community that have proven invaluable to the success of the resettlement project.

This event is one of a series of policy seminars DfC is holding to help staff understand the wide ranging work the Department leads on. The events are designed to promote engagement, collaborative working and learning.

ARK Research Update

ARK have published Number 112, Research Update 'Racism and intolerance towards minority ethnic groups in Northern Ireland' The key points of the research are;

Half of respondents who have contact with someone from a minority ethnic group shared more than just a greeting with them. 29% described such as 'a close interaction such as a lengthy conversation', the highest yet.

The majority of respondents acknowledge the benefits of diversity and inclusion in governance, including a slight increase in acceptance of diversity in public spaces and institutions amongst Protestants.

People aged 18-34 years are most likely to admit to racist language and behaviour. Those aged 18-24 years are most likely to intervene when they witness racism.

Few respondents (18%) are optimistic that there will be less prejudice against minority ethnic groups in Northern Ireland in 5 years' time.

Hope for Youth (Northern Ireland) Open to Applications

The Hope for Youth scheme, previously known as the Women Caring Trust, funds cross-community projects that give disadvantaged young people (aged 11-18) in Northern Ireland the opportunity to work together on practical projects that foster teamwork, creativity and personal development, especially within the arts or in the great outdoors. Grants of up to £5,000 are available. Larger sums may be offered in exceptional circumstances at the Trustee's discretion.

The funding will support projects that focus on music, dance, drama and the arts, as well as outdoor projects that promote personal and team development. Applications must be able to show a cross community emphasis, such as a focus on improving community integration in regard to cultural, ethnic or religious diversity.

UNDERSTANDING AND PROMOTING COMMUNITY WELL-BEING – 21st June 2017

1.30pm – RaISe – Welcome and Opening Remarks

1.45pm – Ms Louise O’Boyle (Ulster) - Promoting community well-being through partnerships and co-production

This presentation will discuss the findings from evidence-based research into the effectiveness of a partnership between Louise O’Boyle (Ulster University) and PIPS Charity North Belfast, over a series of collaborations between 2012-2016. The constituency of North Belfast is an area of multiple disadvantages and has the highest suicide rate in Northern Ireland (Constituency Profile Belfast North, December 2012). These collaborations included a number of arts-based projects that involved post-primary children, PIPS staff and PIPS Family Support Group. The outcomes of these projects were further utilised to promote emotional wellbeing within the local communities of North Belfast. This presentation will focus on the development of the partnership and discuss what were the key considerations, synergies and modes of working utilised to make it effective; how these findings can inform future partnerships within communities.

2.05pm – Dr Sharon Mallon (OU) - The role of paramilitary punishment attacks and intimidation in death by suicide in post agreement Northern Ireland.

The signing of the Good Friday agreement effectively brought an end to the widespread violence associated with the ‘Troubles’. However, communities within Northern Ireland continue to be blighted by an insidious form of violence in the form of punishment beatings and intimidation. Anecdotal evidence published in news media have linked cases of such intimidation and violence to individual cases of suicide. However, to date, there has been a lack of empirical research examining this relationship. The aim of this seminar is to address this gap in our knowledge by examining these forms of violence among a cohort of individuals who died by suicide in Northern Ireland.

2.25pm - Prof Cahal McLaughlin (QUB) – The role of oral history in societies emerging from conflict

Three official reports in Northern Ireland have each recommended storytelling as one of the methods to address the legacy of the past – Bloomfield (1998), Eames-Bradley (2007) and Hass (2014) reports. The proposal of an Oral History Archive in the Stormont House Agreement raises the possibility of similar benefits. The Executive is expected to renew negotiations over such legacy issues. In the meantime, community-based initiatives have filled the vacuum by organizing their own storytelling projects. Healing Through Remembering has produced an audit of such projects and the PEACE 3 funded ‘Accounts of the Conflict’ at Ulster University offers a selection of these on a digital platform. The Prisons Memory Archive, based at QUB, is another such initiative and I propose to present its research findings.
