# **T:BUC Engagement Forum**



#### **T:BUC and its rural impact**

The Killyhevlin Hotel in Enniskillen was packed out on 12th February 2019 with The Executive Office (TEO) and over 150 community practitioners, policy makers and academics meeting for the eighth Together: Building a United Community (T:BUC) Engagement Forum. The event focused on T:BUC and its rural impact. It placed a strong emphasis on what central government and practitioners are doing to engage with rural communities and explore actions that could enable greater participation in promoting good relations.

#### **Shared Learning Forum - Core Groups**



Over 30 people attended the Shared Learning Forum for CRC Core funded groups on the 24th January. The event was hosted in the Barron Hall, home of Community Relations Forum, a Core funded group.

The Shared Learning Forums are designed for Core groups to

- $\cdot$  Learn from each other.
- $\cdot$  Understand the work being delivered by other Core funded groups.
- · Acknowledge the challenges in delivering good relations work.
- $\cdot$  Awareness of delivery methods and means of addressing challenges.

· Feel supported in shared network.

Kathy Wolff from Community Relations Forum made a presentation followed by Claire Heaney-McKee from The Playhouse. Highlights from both presentations are covered overleaf. After some questions and discussion the participants worked in six groups to discuss three focus questions:

 $\cdot$  What are the issues that impact upon you in the delivery of good relations in your work?

 $\cdot$  What help and support do you feel is important to enable you to deliver good relations outcomes?

· Who should be involved and how?

Overall the event was viewed as either useful of very useful by 100% of evaluation respondents who also indicated they would return and attend future events.

Derick is Reader Emeritus in Education (Restorative Practices and Community Relations) at Ulster University, a Member of the Corrymeela Council and in 2019-20, will be a Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence at St Philip's, San Antonio. His first community relations job was as a detached youth worker-youth tutor with the Schools Community Relations Project in Kelvin School (Roden Street), with the Community Relations Commission (1970-73).
