> What Our Views are & What We Think...

Introduction

This research was conducted by a cross community group of young adults as part of their OCN Level 2 Introduction to Youth Work course. They recruited 34 young people in total (16 from Suffolk and 18 from Lenadoon) to get their views on interface violence and peace walls . The age of the interviewees ranged from 11 to 21 years old.

The findings of the research will be used to inform SLIG's work and provide information to the community in relation to the views of our young people.

Survey Introduction

We asked the young people questions relating to interface violence and so-called peace walls.

For those not familiar with the area, Suffolk is a small Unionist enclave community surrounded by the much larger Nationalist community of West Belfast. In Suffolk there are five clear interfaces with numerous 'peace wall' structures, barriers and gates.

The purpose of the research was to ascertain young peoples views on issues connected to the interface; how these issues affect them and how they affect their wider community.

Considering interface violence is often associated with young people, it was important to hear a young person's perspective on what they believe causes the violence, and get their suggestions on how these may be resolved. The timing of the research was also useful to gauge the impact on the interface, if any, of the recent political instability in relation to the flag fall out and the ongoing disputes over parading.



Suffolk Q&A

1a. What are the main causes of interface violence?

Social networking, facebook and twitter Sectarianism Boredom/lack of facilities Property being vandalised Individual disagreements and arguments Gangs Traditional festivals, 12th July and St Patrick's Day Religion

1b. What could be done to stop interface violence?

"Stop gangs" "More facilities" "Have more things in our estate to keep us off the front off the road" "Something for us to do and facilities" "Boycott flags" "Things to do for teenagers" "Everyone to stop arguing" "I don't think anything could be done to stop it" "No rioting"

"Yes there would be less people on the streets" "More trouble would start" "Yes you would get to know new people" "Yes people would make new friends" 6 young people said No

3a. What are the peace walls for?

"To protect the community" "To prevent attacks on estates" "To stop two communities fighting" "To separate us" "To Protect us from them"

3b. Should there be more or less peace walls?

8 said MORE 6 said LESS 2 said just keep them as they are

> "I would like to see less peace walls as the two communities need to stop fighting with each other and start getting along"

3c. What would need to happen for peace walls to come down?

"Less violence" "A miracle" "Suffolk and Lenadoon ones to stop rioting" "More groups and stuff to do between both sides" "People to be friends" "Peace" "No parades commission"

3d. What could be done to change the Peace Walls so the areas around them are more attractive for people living near them?

"Artwork like murals done by young people from both communities" "Ponds, parks, forests and scenery" "Street art"

> "For the peace walls to come down there needs to be no bitterness between the two communities and for each side of the communities to stop fighting with each other"

"When people are in large groups and get over confident"

1c. What are the effects of interface violence on you and your community?

"People don't feel safe going into each other's community because people get jumped"
"Nothing"
"Not being able to walk down your own street without feeling scared"
"Riots and roads being closed so I can't get home"
"Broken windows, It makes us look like scumbags and it's bad for friends"
"Fights, broken windows and cars etc"
"More tensions, more sectarianism and people hating each other"
"It has no effect on me however it has a negative impact on the community"
"I can't go to the shops"
"Damage and no peace, it's like a war"
"I live on Blacks Road and I walk through Suffolk Estate everyday if there's violence I can't get home"

> "Protestants and Catholics going to groups together e.g. SLIG"

17 said yes 1 said no

2b. If yes what would you like to see in it available for young people?

Trips to help team building Games Food Different groups and courses for different age groups Get involved in the community Activities, group work and residential

Food, munchies and games, that's all

2c. Would an interface community drop in centre have an impact on the interface ?

"Yes because they could get to know each other"

"Yes it would help society move on from the past "

"Yes because they would become mates"

"Yes as it will strengthen relationships across the interface"

"Yes there'd be no violence"

"Yes if it works it would change attitudes of young people towards people with different religions and backgrounds"

"I don't know"

"Yes, because it would decrease violence"

"No as people will be closer together giving them more chance to fight together"

"Yes because SLIG made Prods and Catholics become friendlier to each other so this would to"

3a. What are peace walls for?

"To keep peace between the two communities" "To make peace" "Funny enough to make peace!" To separate two different communities and to help decrease violence" "To stop fighting from each side" "To stop violence" "To separate Protestants from Catholics to make peace"

3b. Should there be more or less peace walls?

3 young said MORE 15 said LESS

"To make Protestants and Catholics be friendlier to each other"

"Some people feel threatened to walk through Lenadoon because they are Protestant and people sometimes start fights with them because they're sectarian so it means you can't have many Protestant friends"

3c. What would need to happen for peace walls to come down?

"To get on with each other" "Communities to communicate and move on from the past" "Different communities to become mates and not fight" "A mutual agreement for peace between the two communities" "Take them down when every is in bed sleeping!" "To all come together and make peace" "Both communities working together better" "No sectarianism" "No violence" "The two communities would need to make peace"

3d. What could be done to change the Peace Walls so the areas around them are more attractive for people living near them?

"Artwork on them that local people have done to make them more colourful but should relate to both culture but represent peace"

"Graffiti art" "Historical pictures of both communities" "nothing keep them as they are".
