

Keeping connected





Virtual Reality Challenging Sectarian Prejudice



Virtual Reality is being used to help challenge stereotypes and reduce sectarian prejudice in a project developed through Queen's University Belfast with assistance from the Community Relations Council (CRC).

Dr Salvador Alvidrez, principal investigator for the project, joined CRC for a research secondment during 2019.

Virtual reality (VR) is an emergent technology that is currently being applied to many areas such as business, health care and entertainment. It has become more affordable and popular in recent years.

"Our project will test social interactions in VR between members of the Catholic and Protestant communities in Northern Ireland and their influence in overcoming prejudiced perceptions," Salvador explained.

1000 Paper Cranes CR/CD Funded Project



1000 Paper Cranes is an art project for the whole family that involves using the template (found below) to fold paper into the iconic shape of a crane. The crane has long been a symbol of hope and longevity in Japanese culture.

The project was developed by Centre for Democracy and Peace Building (CDPB) with funding from the Community Relations Council to help celebrate diversity and peace.

As part of the initial project, there were several workshops that helped create 1000 paper cranes.

Now the template for making the paper cranes is available as part of a toolkit with full instruction on how to make this origami marvel with you and your loved ones during the covid-19 lockdown, and beyond.
